Bereavement in Northern Ireland

- Over 17k people die each year in NI with an average of 5 directly affected by each death - 85k newly bereaved each year
- Several Public Inquiries recommended improvements in bereavement services (HOI 2002 and IHRD 2019)
- In April 2020 CMO commissioned Covid-19 Bereavement Network
- Developed resources to support the bereaved during the pandemic
- Produced a report with 7 recommendations for improvement of services to support bereaved people





Background & Implementation of NIBN

The Northern Ireland Department of Health developed and finalised the report "COVID-19 Guidance:

Bereavement Advice and Support" in 2021.



A key recommendation was the Health and Social Care Bereavement Network should be expanded to become the Northern Ireland Bereavement Network (NIBN), with responsibility for developing and leading the strategic bereavement plan for the next 10 years.



One of four NIBN work streams was to develop a new website for the public and healthcare professionals to provide information and compassionate support required throughout the bereavement journey.





NI Bereavement Network

- Established at the direction of the Minister May (2021)
- Report to the Chief Professional Officers
- Cross-sector representation
- Linking with other jurisdictions
- ► Tasked with implementing the 7 recommendations



A "whole society" model for bereavement support

- Recommendation 2: That the HSC Bereavement Network is expanded to become the Northern Ireland Bereavement Network, with responsibility for developing a 10 year strategic plan
- Recommendation 5: A bereavement support website/hub should be developed to centralise and improve access to information







Rationale

► The development of a website for NI with easily accessible bereavement support information for every bereavement journey with 'Living, Dying Grieving' as a conceptual framework. The website content seeks to reflect Northern Ireland's culture and population needs, specifically the higher levels of poor mental health and suicide rates.¹





Design

The design of this website encompassed a 'whole society' model for bereavement support, reflecting the evidence-based public health model of needs-based bereavement care.²

The design and ongoing development is cross sectoral, co-produced and was refined through public and government engagement via a World Café event and Citizen Space feedback platform.

The website is fully compliant with international accessibility standards.³






Results

Google Analytics and an onsite feedback facility provide the editorial group with data on current usage of 'Bereaved NI' which informs ongoing development of the website.

Support during bereavement can be "a lifeline", a man who lost his wife and son has told BBC News NI.


He was speaking after health Minister Robin Swann launched a website to help people in Northern Ireland through grief.
